

Our Bereavement Ministry helps those who are grieving the loss of a loved one during their most difficult times. They meet on Wednesdays at 11 AM at St. Mark's.



"In the beginning, when God created the heavens and the earth, the earth was a formless wasteland and darkness covered the abyss while a mighty wind swept over the waters. Then God said, "Let there be light......" Genesis Chapter 1

CYO Sophomore, Sarah D, opened up our CYO Bible Night by telling us the story of creation.

The CYO this past Sunday gave tribute to our Saints (Monday is All Saints Day) by our members each telling us their confirmation name and something about that Saint. We learned about Saints Isidore, Therese of Lisieux, Sebastian, Jude, Mark, Cecelia, Julie, Francis of Assisi, Catherine, Margaret, Julia, Marie and John the Apostle!!!!!!!

Our theme was: identifying people in the world who are alone, isolated or rejected and then our obligations as Christians to try and be there for them. Jesus was outstanding at doing this. He embraced the leper that everyone else shunned. He alone stood with the woman caught in the act of adultery. He sought out those rejected and condemned by the world and offered them compassion and love. Our CYO members presented improvisations about Mother Teresa reaching out to people dying alone on the streets of Calcutta, aiding a seven year old child abandoned by a human trafficker at the border, teens protecting a girl at a drinking party from being taken advantage of, and a girl at a high school lunch table being pressured to have an abortion by everyone except one girl named Maura who is defending her baby's right to life. In all these well-acted out scenarios, we saw how someone can be completely abandoned by the world, but one brave and compassionate person stepped in to help that person. Our seniors Kyle and Anthony read us the story of David, Bathsheba, Uriah and Nathan. Uriah (to cover David's sin) was left all alone on the battlefield and died because David told his fellow soldiers to put him in the front lines where he would be killed. Nathan the Prophet, sent by God to confront David (2 Samuel: Chapter 11 and 12) concluded his admonishment of David with the powerful words: "You are That Man!!!!!!!!!!" That "man" is us too if we pretend we don't have an obligation to rescue others. All throughout the world, even in our midst, people are abandoned: innocent people like the unborn, the elderly in nursing homes, helpless children trafficked and then left at the border. We have many opportunities to reach out to these that are rejected or maltreated by the world. Like Jesus, Mother Teresa and all our great saints, are we be willing to reach out to them and help them in their time of need?

ll Hallows' Day, the Solemnity of All Saints, or All Saints' Day is a celebration of all Catholic saints held on November 1 each year. "On this solemnity, we recall the holy men and women who, having completed their earthly journeys, now live forever with God. These saints, though not canonized, offer us models of abiding faith and love of God and neighbor" (Essential Guide to Seasons and Saints, 109).

In the Catholic Church, we are called to imitate and venerate saints because of their heroically virtuous lives, martyrdom, or their offering of life for others. But, what does veneration mean and why do we pray to the saints?

Veneration of the saints fosters our faith in God and does not detract from it. Rather, our faith in God is strengthen by our relationship with our brothers and sisters in the faith who are in heaven. The Church teaches that by imitating the virtues lived by the saints, the saints brings us closer to Christ. When we ask the saints to pray for us, we ask them to join their wills with the will of God and intercede for us here on earth. This is the Communion of Saints which we profess every Sunday in the Creed.



Ciertamente que un sumo sacerdote como éste era el que nos convenía: santo, inocente, inmaculado, separado de los pecadores y elevado por encima de los cielos; que no necesita, como los demás sacerdotes, ofrecer diariamente víctimas, primero por sus pecados y después por los del pueblo, porque esto lo hizo de una vez para siempre, ofreciéndose a sí mismo. Porque los sacerdotes constituidos por la ley eran hombres llenos de fragilidades; pero el sacerdote constituido por las palabras del juramento posterior a la ley, es el Hijo eternamente perfecto.
