Reading 1

SIR 3:2-6, 12-14

God sets a father in honor over his children; a mother's authority he confirms over her sons. Whoever honors his father atomes for sins, and preserves himself from them. 

Many thanks to all those who donated new thermal clothing that will be distributed to the homeless on Christmas Day by the Missionaries of Charity sisters. They were delighted to receive them and mentioned to us when we dropped them off that many of the homeless in the area had already contacted them asking if they could receive them soon.

I recall years ago when the CYO spent a day preparing and serving dinners at The Center in Asbury Park that as two men were leaving, we gave them lots of food but they would not take any decorations we offered them. I asked them why and they told me they were homeless. They sought shelter each night underneath the boardwalk, in a train station or an abandoned home. I hugged them both and they left--hauling over their shoulders



huge garbage bags carrying all of their world's possessions. Both also had the Aids virus.

I also recall checking out \$200 worth of toys at Kmart a few Christmases ago. The cashier asked me why I had purchased so many toys. I told her that the CYO wanted to donate toys to a local toy drive. This woman abruptly left her cash register, came around to me, hugged me and declared for all to hear that these drives had saved her the year before when she had no money to buy her kids toy for Christmas.

So often we wonder if our contributions make a difference. Yes they do. The proceeds we receive from our wreath sale are helping the destitute poor in Uganda, the girls rejected from their own homes because they choose to give life to their unborn children, and places like Madonna House and the Missionaries of Charity who clothe and feed all the needy people in our area year in and year out.




St. Mark's would like to let our Parishioners know what practices we have in place to protect them during the pandemic so



that they can make informed decisions on whether they feel they would like to attend in person Masses. Social distancing with roped off pews which allows those present to sit at least 6 feet apart, all pews, door handles and railings are sanitized after every Mass daily and during the weekend Masses and Sacraments, sanitizer is at the front and side entrances, bathrooms are cleaned and sanitized on a regular basis, masks must be worn by everyone in the church, the priests and Extraordinary Ministers use hand sanitizer before distributing Communion, Communion is distributed one side at a time to allow for social distance, the windows are open during Mass to help circulate air, collection baskets are placed on the Altar rail rather than the Ushers handling the collection, weekend requirement is entrance thru the front doors for Parishioner count but you may exit thru all doors.

Reflection by Rev. Leonard N. Peterson

To be cute about it, I quote here an American humorist by the name of Evan Esar (d. 1995): "Family: A social unit where the father is concerned with parking space, the children with outer space, and the mother with closet space."

Whether Mr. Esar was fully correct or not, there is a grain of truth in what he wrote, and there is always some truth in wholesome humor.

However, for my purpose I prefer this statement of Sir Winston Churchill about the nature of family. "There is no doubt that it is around family and the home that all the greatest virtues ...are created, strengthened, and maintained."

Over this holiday time of year we are most likely to be with family, either literally or virtually because of the virus. We can verify Sir Winston's observation. Family also gives us the answers to most of life's important questions.

Do you think the young Jesus had questions? Certainly He must have, because remember He took on a human nature "like ours in everything but sin." What is one of the principal ways we learn? Through answers to questions. Through that triple-spoke process of lessons taught, example given, and experience lived, Our Lord and Savior indeed grew in wisdom and grace.

I think it is an important detail that all this happened in the little village of Nazareth. It was located on the edge of the empire, far from the high society and corruption of Rome. So insignificant was it that it is nowhere even mentioned in the whole Old Testament. Great things can happen in humble places, as our family homes most often attest.

Could Our Lord have had better teachers in how to handle life than Mary and Joseph? Hardly. Without any advanced degrees after their names, we can say with conviction that both Christ's parents had "PhD's" in holiness. Mary who was declared "full of grace" by an archangel, and Joseph remembered as a "just man" in the Scriptural sense cannot be excelled at their task. The Holy Spirit has decided not to tell us if any peers taught Jesus things, but we can imagine they too played a part, for better or worse, in His human upbringing. So we stand back for a time from all our concerns to admire and celebrate this Holy Family. We can see the necessity of these thirty or so years to prepare Our Lord for His incomparable mission.

That brings up the subject of our mission. Obviously it begins in our family circle, but it has to expand from there if we are to take our Baptismal and Confirmation promises seriously. That means doing our part to tell the waiting world all about Jesus and His Good News, even if the world neither acknowledges nor cares that it is waiting. Waiting for something, or more accurately, Someone, beyond its own calculations to give it purpose. Taking up the admonitions of Sirach and Colossians, which we read this weekend, is a good place to begin. After all, that's our way to heaven. Here is George Bernard Shaw's take on family: "A happy family is but an earlier heaven." Think about that! God love you and give you His peace in 2021!

Con el corazón lleno de gratitud, alaben a Dios con salmos, himnos y cánticos espirituales; y todo lo que digan y todo lo que hagan, háganlo en el nombre del Señor Jesús, dándole gracias a Dios Padre, por medio de Cristo. Mujeres, respeten la autoridad de sus maridos, como lo quiere el Señor. Maridos, amen a sus esposas y no sean rudos con ellas. Hijos, obedezcan en todo a sus padres, porque eso es agradable al Señor. Padres, no exijan demasiado a sus hijos, para que no se depriman.



Aclamación antes del Evangelio: Colosenses 3, 15. 16.

R. Aleluya, aleluya. Que en sus corazones reine la paz de Cristo; que la palabra de Cristo habite en ustedes con toda su riqueza.

Evangelio: Lucas 2, 22-40.

Transcurrido el tiempo de la purificación de María, según la ley de Moisés, ella y José llevaron al niño a Jerusalén para presentarlo al Señor, de acuerdo con lo escrito en la ley: Todo primogénito varón será consagrado al Señor, y también para ofrecer, como dice la ley, un par de tórtolas o dos pichones. Vivía en Jerusalén un hombre llamado Simeón, varón justo y temeroso de Dios, que aguardaba el consuelo de Israel; en él moraba el Espíritu Santo, el cual le había revelado que no moriría sin haber visto antes al Mesías del Señor. Movido por el Espíritu, fue al templo, y cuando José y María entraban con el niño Jesús para cumplir con lo prescrito por la ley, Simeón lo tomó en brazos y bendijo a Dios, diciendo: "Señor, ya puedes dejar morir en paz a tu siervo, según lo que me habías prometido, porque mis ojos han visto a tu Salvador, al que has preparado para bien de todos los pueblos; luz que alumbra a las naciones y gloria de tu pueblo, Israel". El padre y la madre del niño estaban admirados de semejantes palabras. Simeón los bendijo, y a María, la madre de Jesús, le anunció: "Este niño ha sido puesto para ruina y resurgimiento de muchos en Israel, como signo que provocará contradicción, para que queden al descubierto los pensamientos de todos los corazones. Y a ti, una espada te atravesará el alma".

Había también una profetisa, Ana, hija de Fanuel, de la tribu de Aser. Era una mujer muy anciana. De joven, había vivido siete años casada y tenía ya ochenta y cuatro años de edad. No se apartaba del templo ni de día ni de noche, sirviendo a Dios con ayunos y oraciones. Ana se acercó en aquel momento, dando gracias a Dios y hablando del niño a todos los que aguardaban la liberación de Israel. Y cuando cumplieron todo lo que prescribía la ley del Señor, se volvieron a Galilea, a su ciudad de Nazaret. El niño iba creciendo y fortaleciéndose, se llenaba de sabiduría y la gracia de Dios estaba con él.
