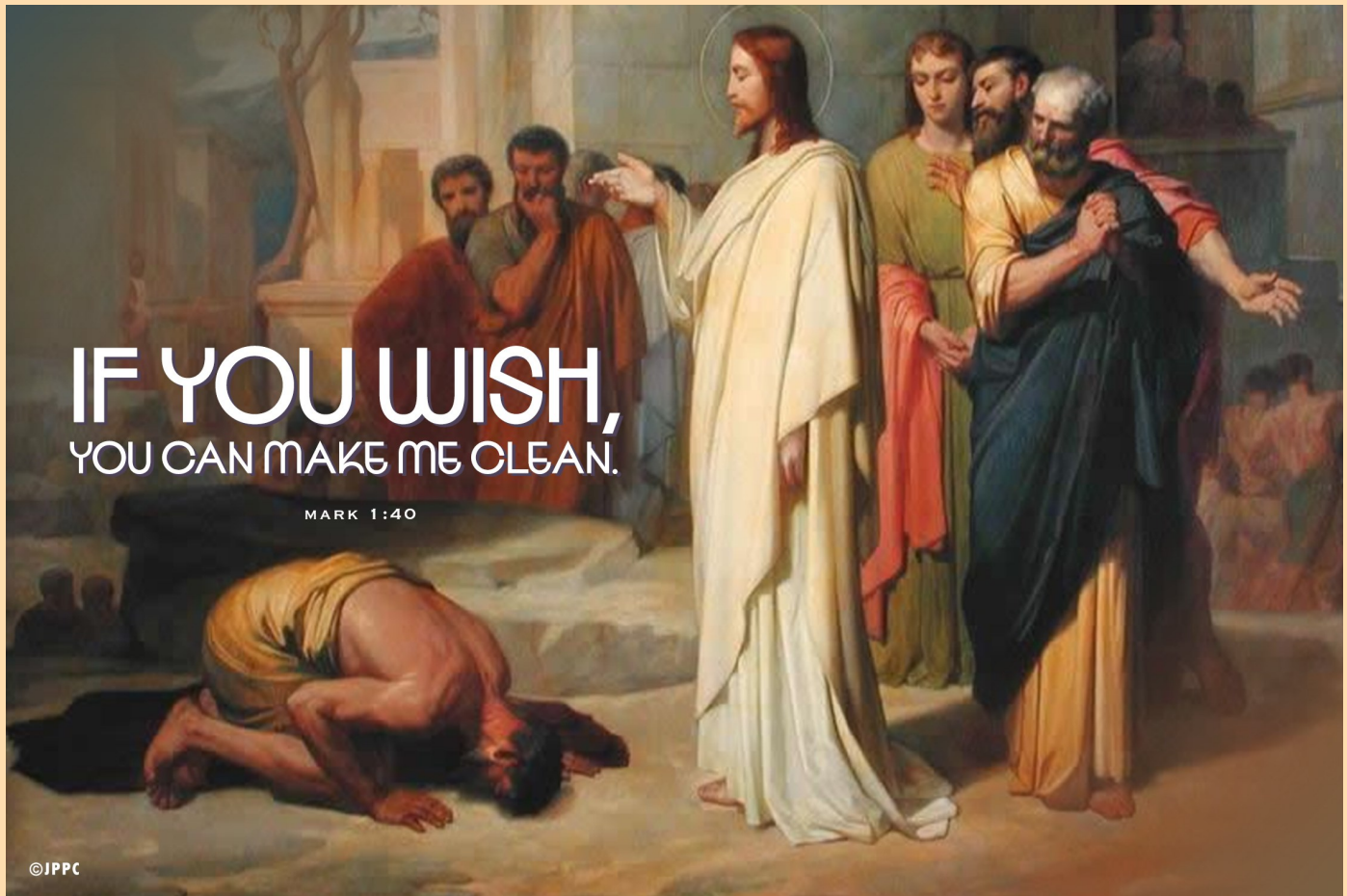

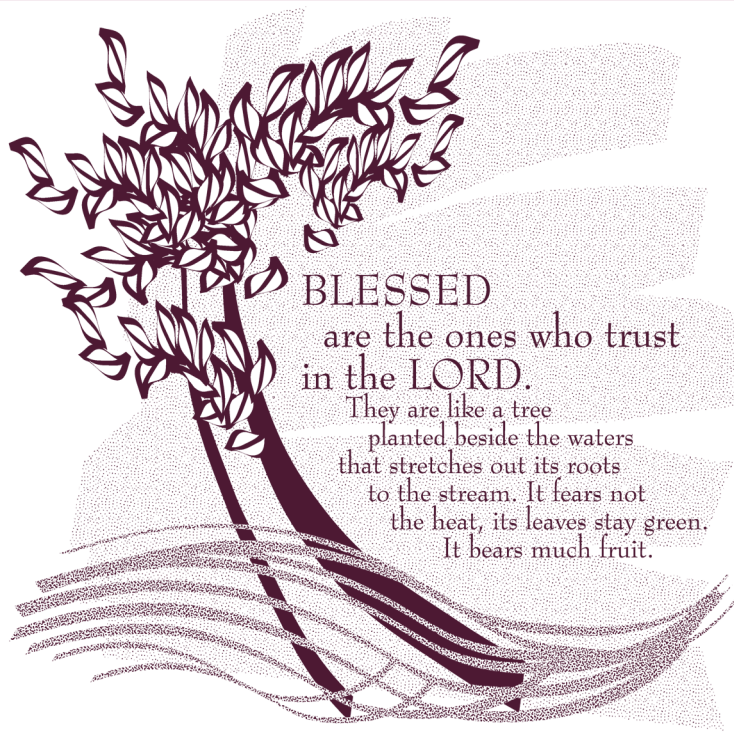

Reading I

Lv 13:1-2, 44-46

The LORD said to Moses and Aaron, "If someone has on his skin a scab or pustule or blotch which appears to be the sore of leprosy, he shall be brought to Aaron, the priest, or to one of the priests among his descendants.

If the man is leprous and unclean, the priest shall declare him unclean by reason of the sore on his head.

"The one who bears the sore of leprosy shall keep his garments rent and his head bare, and shall muffle his beard; he shall cry out, 'Unclean, unclean!'

Reflection by Rev. Leonard N. Peterson

You are in the doctor's exam room, perched on the side of the examination table, awaiting the doctor's return. When he does so, the doctor brings another one with him. Their combined verdict is clear: "You have a strong case of cancer."

Since you've been a patient of this man for many years, you know of his special concern for you. You inherently know how much the doctor would rather be saying something else.

That's how it could be for any one of us since the arrival of cancer and its varied forms. You dread the sudden imposition of isolation this may bring. Most family and friends take on this serious air around you. You are grateful for

those who can still share a laugh with you, no matter the subject. And when you are alone, you try to remember that instead of holding a "pity party" for yourself.

All of that was part of the plight of the unnamed leper who met Jesus on that long ago day. He knew the pain of his condition, but the social strictures Leviticus demanded in those days that he live apart from family and friends and shout out to everybody "Unclean! Unclean!" Jesus will thus make all the difference.

Mark's description that Jesus was "moved with pity," is a bit tepid rendition of the original Greek word used here which is "embrimesamenos." The word means rather "strong emotions that boil over and find expression in groaning." That was the depth of the healing love in Our Lord's great heart that day.

This weekend finds us in "the vestibule," so to speak, of Lent. We can easily acknowledge our need of repentance at any time, but Lent is a special season for this. Think of it as a retreat. At least as a time to zero in on the "leprosy" of sin that infects our souls regularly. How supportive, consoling, and hopeful it is to know that God sent us His son as an emissary who could be so concerned for our healing as to *groan* over us! I believe that prompted Jesus to say on another occasion "Come to Me, all you who labor and are burdened, and I will refresh you."

Bishop Robert Barron offers this complementary pre-Lenten observation: "*It is a biblical commonplace that we are unable to save ourselves from sin, since the very powers that we would muster to do so—the mind, the will, and the passions—are precisely what sin has compromised. Our only hope, therefore, is in the divine salvation offered as a gift.*"

In Lent, we're all, figuratively speaking, in "the office" of the Divine Physician, the Healer of souls. Tell him your condition, and then listen attentively. And don't be like this man who consulted with his doctor. "I have a terrible problem," he confided. "I've been carousing and misbehaving. It's been happening more and more frequently, and my conscience is beginning to trouble me very deeply. Can you give me something that will help?"

The doctor replied "Oh, I see, you want me to give you something to strengthen your willpower?" "No" the patient protested. "That's not it. I don't want to strengthen my willpower. I want you to give me something to weaken my conscience." Have a good Lent. God love you, and give you His peace.



Entering the desert of Lent 2021: These 40 Days

Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

During the days and weeks of penance that lie ahead --- from **Ash Wednesday, February 17 until Holy Thursday, April 1, 2021**--- the Catholic Church throughout the world commemorates the penitential season of Lent. The model Jesus gave us for “these forty days” was his own experience in the desert and the temptations that followed him there where he encountered Satan face-to-face. And yet, Jesus, there in the desert --- alone, fasting and in intense prayer --- beat back the devil and triumphed over temptation, as strong and as unrelenting as it was throughout those forty days.

We enter the desert of Lent like Jesus, led by the Holy Spirit, to face our devils, our temptations head on. But we are not alone. The Lord Jesus Christ is with us. And so, too, is the Church, the entire community of faith observing Lent. Here is what the Catholic Church in the United States requires of us as baptized Catholics:

1. **The days of FAST (only one full meal) and ABSTINENCE (no meat) are Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. No dispensations are granted on these solemn days except for reason of sickness or those provided in canon law below.**
2. **All other Fridays of Lent are days of ABSTINENCE (no meat).**

Those between the ages of 18 and 59 are obliged to FAST (only one full meal) as above. From the age of 14, people are also obliged to ABSTAIN (no meat: this obligation prohibits the eating of meat, but not eggs, milk products or condiments of any kind, even though made from animal fat).

The obligation to observe the laws of fast and abstinence is a serious one for Catholics. Failure to observe one penitential day in itself is not considered a serious sin. It is the failure to observe any penitential days at all, or a substantial number of penitential days, that must be considered serious.

The obligation, the privilege really, of receiving the Eucharist at least once a year --- often called “Easter duty” --- for those in the state of grace should still be fulfilled during the period from the **First Sunday of Lent, February 21-to Trinity Sunday, May 30.**

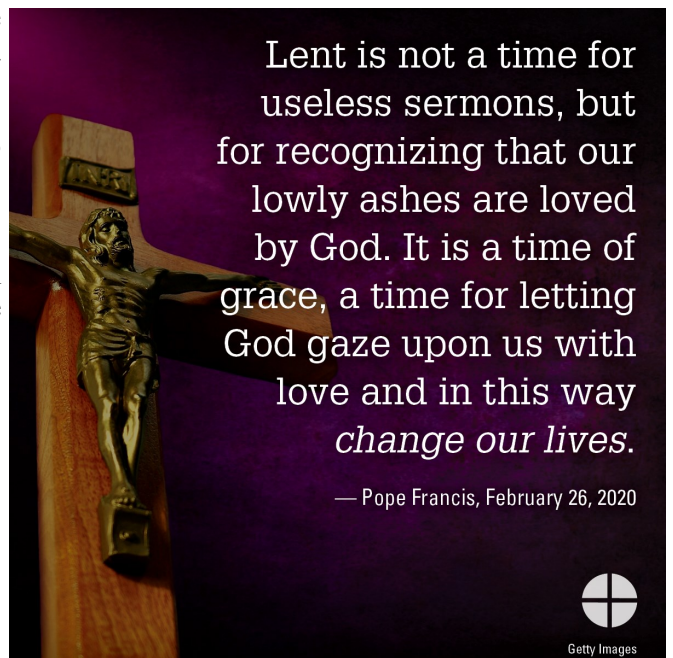
However, the Church’s law does permit this precept to be fulfilled at another time during the year when there is a just cause.

I want to encourage Catholics to go to Confession and to make use of the sacrifices and traditions that have always been part of our Lenten practices in the Church.

We do, indeed, fast and pray with the Lord Jesus and with our fellow Catholics. May this Lent be a time of penance leading to grace and joy for us all at Easter.

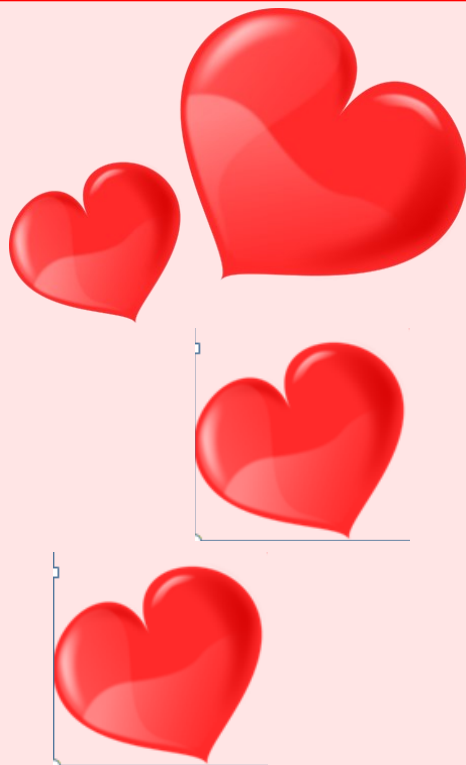

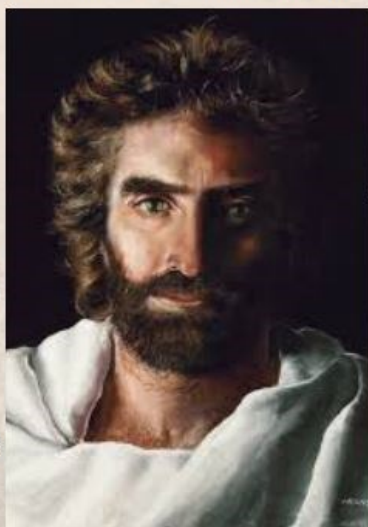

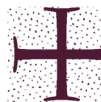

God's Gift of Forgiveness

A Pastoral Exhortation on the Sacrament of Penance and Reconciliation

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ:

"Peace be with you!" With these words, the Risen Lord greeted his frightened Apostles in the Upper Room on the day of his Resurrection. They were troubled, anxious, and fearful—much like each one of us at some point in our lives. Christ repeated the words, "Peace be with you." But then he added, "Receive the holy Spirit. Whose sins you forgive are forgiven them" (Jn 20:19-23).

What an extraordinary gift! The Risen Lord was proclaiming that all the suffering he had just endured was in order to make available the gifts of salvation and forgiveness. He wanted the Apostles to receive these gifts. He wanted them to become apostles of this forgiveness to others.

In the Sacrament of Penance and Reconciliation, also called confession, we meet the Lord, who wants to grant forgiveness and the grace to live a renewed life in him. In this sacrament, he prepares us to receive him free from serious sin, with a lively faith, earnest hope, and sacrificial love in the Eucharist. The Church sees confession as so important that she requires that every Catholic go at least once a year.¹ The Church also encourages frequent confession in order to grow closer to Christ Jesus and his Body, the Church. By the grace of the Holy Spirit, we seek forgiveness and repentance, let go of patterns

of sin, grow in the life of virtue, and witness to a joyful conversion. Since the graces of the sacrament are so similar to the purpose of the New Evangelization, Pope Benedict XVI has said, "The New Evangelization . . . begins in the confessional!"²

We bishops and priests are eager to help you if you experience difficulty, hesitation, or uncertainty about approaching the Lord in this sacrament. If you have not received this healing sacrament in a long time, we are ready to

welcome you. We, whom Christ has ordained to minister this forgiveness in his name, are also approaching this sacrament, as both penitents and ministers, throughout our lives and at this special moment of grace during Lent. We want to offer ourselves to you as forgiven sinners seeking to serve in the Lord's name.

During Lent—in addition to the various penitential services during which individual confession takes place—we bishops and priests will be making ourselves available often for the individual celebration of this sacrament. We pray that through the work of the Holy Spirit, all Catholics—clergy and laity—will respond to the call of the New Evangelization to encounter Christ in the Sacrament of Penance and Reconciliation. Come to the Lord and experience the extraordinary grace of his forgiveness!

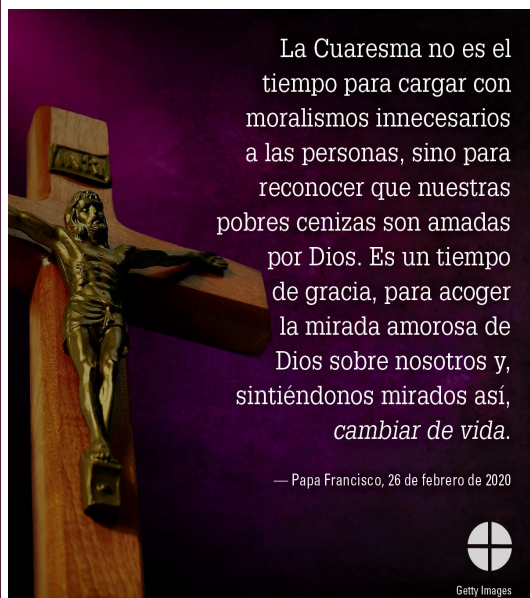
