ANNOUNCEMENT OF THE NEW JERSEY BISHOPS
Reinstating the General Obligation to Attend Mass

At this time, due to the observance of public safety protocols and the increase in the availability of vaccines, we have begun a return to some sense of normalcy in various sectors of our society.

Therefore, we the Catholic Bishops of New Jersey, are lifting the dispensation of the Sunday and Holy Days Mass obligation beginning on Saturday, June 5, 2021, and Sunday, June 6, 2021, Solemnity of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ. We welcome the Christian faithful to return to the regular participation in the Sunday Eucharist, the source and summit of our Catholic faith (cf. Code of Canon Law canon 1247 and Catechism of the Catholic Church, n. 2180).

This obligation does not apply to those who are ill; those who have reason to believe that they were recently exposed to the coronavirus or another serious or contagious illness; those who are confined to their home, a hospital, or nursing facility; or those with serious underlying health conditions. One should consult the local pastor if questions arise about the obligation to attend Mass (canon 87).

Please remember that the COVID pandemic is still active and wearing masks is still an option for those who want to continue wearing them. Those who are unvaccinated are also encouraged to continue wearing masks. No one is to be refused sacraments due to vaccination status.



Catholic Charities Covid Outreach Update

The primary goal of Catholic Charities' Covid19 vaccination outreach is to reduce barriers such as transportation, language, lack of health insurance etc. in the Black and Hispanic communities. These communities have been disproportionately impacted by the pandemic and are lagging well behind the vaccination rate of the white population.

Catholic Charities is educating communities about vaccines, recruiting and training community healthcare workers and hosting clinics at which to date, over 600 people have been vaccinated.

The Solemnity of the Most Holy Trinity

The Mystery of the Holy Trinity

"The Feast of the Most Holy Trinity leads us to contemplate the mystery of God who unceasingly creates, redeems and sanctifies, always with love and through love."—Pope Francis, May 27, 2018

The mystery of the Holy Trinity is the central mystery of the Christian faith and life. God reveals himself as Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. The doctrine of the Trinity includes three truths of faith.

First, the Trinity is One. We do not speak of three gods but of one God. Each of the Persons is fully God. They are a unity of Persons in one divine nature.

Second, the Divine Persons are distinct from each other. Father, Son, and Spirit are not three appearances or modes of God, but three identifiable persons, each fully God in a way distinct from the others.

Third, the Divine Persons are in relation to each other. The distinction of each is understood only in reference to the others. The Father cannot be the Father without the Son, nor can the Son be the Son without the Father. The Holy Spirit is related to the Father and the Son who both send him forth.

All Christians are baptized in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit. The Trinity illumines all the other mysteries of faith.

The Feast of the Visitation of Mary

Monday, May 31, 2021

This feast commemorates the three-month visit of Mary with her elderly cousin Elizabeth during Mary's pregnancy with Jesus and Elizabeth's with John the Baptist. The story appears in the first chapter of Luke's Gospel. It recounts Elizabeth's Spirit-filled greeting, acknowledging Mary as "the mother of my Lord," and Mary's beautiful response, the Magnificat, which begins, "My soul proclaims the greatness of the Lord." Introduced by the Franciscans in 1263, the feast became universal in the 16th century.

The scholarship application form provides details about writing a short essay and providing your academic accomplishments.

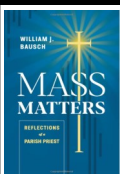

Reflection by Rev. Leonard N. Peterson

Not wishing to be facetious about anything related to the pandemic that has hovered over the human landscape like a repulsive ogre for longer than a year I have a half serious complaint. I would simply like to urge the quick retirement of three phrases the Covid ushered into our expressions. None of them are improper English. But to me, they became so overused, overwrought and annoying just like that poor word “awesome” has become by the younger folk among us who use it to describe everything.

The phrases are, in no particular order: “Out of an abundance of caution;” followed by “social distancing” and “for the sake of transparency.” You surely recognize them. Maybe you’re not as bothered as I am. So be it.

But today I will grant a certain “pardon” to that third on my list, namely “transparency.” Before Covid, the word had an innocent purpose, it defined the visual quality of items like tracing paper and clean windows. Of course politicians have used it to mean “open about my purposes” and the like. Despite their most sincere facial expressions as they say the word, prompting news outlets to search their files on the speaker. But I digress.

A wonderful fact to consider at Mass is that once upon a time there walked on this good earth a Man of distinction who personified transparency to the nth degree. Being also God personally present in an adopted human nature, He could be no less. It is He who presented the revelation of God the Supreme Being as one, but comprised of three distinct Persons. It was and is the truth about God, whether or not our puny intellects can grasp it. He would have been deceitful not to tell us. This transparency on His part has set an everlasting challenge for us. Everything remains academic and harmless until someone asks: “What does it mean?” followed by “How do I explain it?” The famous attempt to make it tenable by using a shamrock, as attributed to St. Patrick, is pure legend. So what do we do with this actual inbred curiosity of ours that prompts us to do such things as build exploratory hardware for work on Mars?

Here’s the transparent fact: we cannot explain the Trinity. But our faith in the Master who taught it guarantees its place in our creed. One wholesome deduction we can make, and one that I prefer, and am even exhilarated by, is that our Creator shared this intimate fact about Himself so that our love of Him would be based entirely on truth. He wants us to know the whole truth about Himself and nothing less. There shall be no holding back, as so often happens with purely human relationships. Once an essential element of a loved one’s background is held back from the lover, only to be revealed at a later crucial juncture, the love usually dissipates, never to be fully rekindled. The good Lord does not deal with us in any way like that.

Consider the dizzy array of pagan presumptions made in the past about what God is like. Their statues of gods with human torsos crowned with birds’ heads, or creatures more bizarre, testify more to their creativity than their grasp of truth. But that was not their fault, since they were bereft of authentic revelation. We, on the other hand, have the whole truth and nothing but our fragile grasp. The problem is that we can become indifferent or bored with it, and turn to our own idols like wealth, pleasure, or power. This great Springtime feast reminds us of what we have, and our obligation to requite the Love of Christ Jesus that gave it to us.

Blessed John Henry Cardinal Newman, one of my favorites, once wrote, “My God, the Paraclete, if I differ at all from the world, it is because You have chosen me...and have lit up the love of God in my heart. If I differ from Your saints, it is because I do not ask earnestly enough for Your grace, and for enough of it, and because I do not diligently improve what You have given me. Increase in me this grace of love.”

Reading I: Deuteronomy 4: 32-34, 39-40

This selection highlights the unique calling of the Chosen People, which the author links with the uniqueness of Yahweh.

Reading II: Romans 8: 14-17

Through the Spirit the Christian becomes an adopted “Child of God.” This allows him and her to call God “Abba,” which is translated “Daddy.”

The Gospel: Matthew 28: 16-20

This closing section of Matthew’s gospel comprises what has come to be called “The Great Commission.” By reason of their baptism, future converts will be able to share God the Son’s life. Additionally, they will acknowledge the fact that, according to Jesus, God is three Persons yet One.

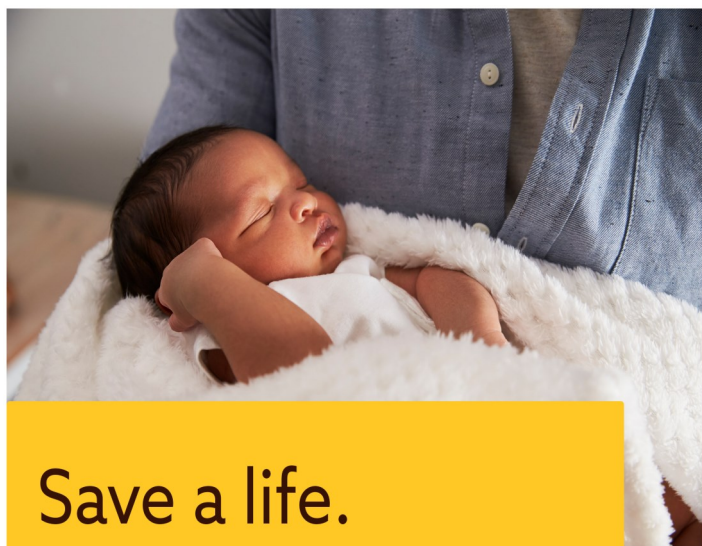


Eucharistic Devotion

This is an extension of the adoration of the Blessed Sacrament which occurs in every Mass: "Behold the Lamb of God, behold him who takes away the sins of the world. Blessed are those called to the supper of the Lamb." Exposition of the Blessed Sacrament flows from the sacrifice of the Mass and serves to deepen our hunger for Communion with Christ and the rest of the Church. The Rite concludes with the ordained minister blessing the faithful with the Blessed Sacrament.

While everyone is not yet able to participate in the Mass in person, we encourage those who are able to make a visit on Fridays immediately after the 11 AM Mass for Adoration. Benediction begins at 1:45PM. Come spend some quiet time with the Lord.

There are less participants than at Mass and all safety precautions are being taken. Masks must be worn at all times in Church.

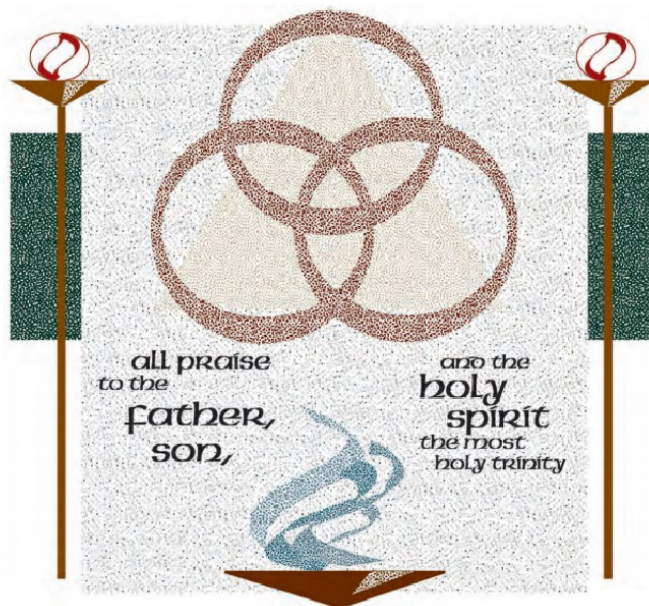

DECLARACIÓN DE LOS OBISPOS DE NUEVA JERSEY

Sobre restablecer la obligación general de asistir a Misa

En este momento, debido a la práctica de protocolos de seguridad y a un aumento en la disponibilidad y acceso a las vacunas, hemos iniciado un regreso a un cierto sentido de normalidad en varios sectores de nuestra sociedad.

Por consiguiente, nosotros, los Obispos católicos de Nueva Jersey, levantamos la dispensa del precepto dominical y festivo, comenzando el fin de semana del sábado y domingo, 5 -6 de junio de 2021, Solemnidad del Cuerpo y la sangre de Cristo (Corpus Christi). Acogemos a los fieles en su regreso a la participación continua de la eucaristía dominical, fuente y culmen de la fe católica (véase Código de derecho canónico, 1247 y Catecismo de la iglesia católica, n. 2180).

Esta obligación no aplica para aquellos que estén enfermos; para aquellos que tengan una razón de peso y crean que recientemente estuvieron expuestos al coronavirus o a otra enfermedad seria o contagiosa; para aquellos que estén confinados en sus hogares, en un hospital, u hogar de ancianos; o para aquellos con condiciones serias de salud. Debes consultar con tu párroco local si surgen preguntas sobre la obligación de asistir a Misa (Canon 87).

Finalmente, siguen vigentes los protocolos de seguridad (llevar mascarilla, distancia social, etc.) y las directrices litúrgicas en cada Diócesis de Nueva Jersey, hasta que se modifiquen o revoquen estas directrices por el respectivo Obispo diocesano del área.
