Eleventh Sunday in Ordinary Time

Lectionary: 92

Reading I Ez 17:22-24

Thus says the Lord GOD:

I, too, will take from the crest of the cedar, from its topmost branches tear off a tender shoot, and plant it on a high and lofty mountain; on the mountain heights of Israel I will plant it. It shall put forth branches and bear fruit, and become a majestic cedar.

Birds of every kind shall dwell beneath it, every winged thing in the shade of its boughs.

And all the trees of the field shall know that I, the LORD, bring low the high tree, lift high the lowly tree, wither up the green tree, and make the withered tree bloom.

As I, the LORD, have spoken, so will I do.

Jesus said to the crowds:

“This is how it is with the kingdom of God; it is as if a man were to scatter seed on the land and would sleep and rise night and day and through it all the seed would sprout and grow, he knows not how.

Of its own accord the land yields fruit, first the blade, then the ear, then the full grain in the ear.

And when the grain is ripe, he wields the sickle at once, for the harvest has come.”

He said, “To what shall we compare the kingdom of God, or what parable can we use for it?

It is like a mustard seed that, when it is sown in the ground, is the smallest of all the seeds on the earth. But once it is sown, it springs up and becomes the largest of plants and puts forth large branches, so that the birds of the sky can dwell in its shade.”

With many such parables he spoke the word to them as they were able to understand it.

Without parables he did not speak to them, but to his own disciples he explained everything in private.

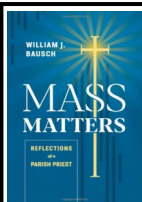

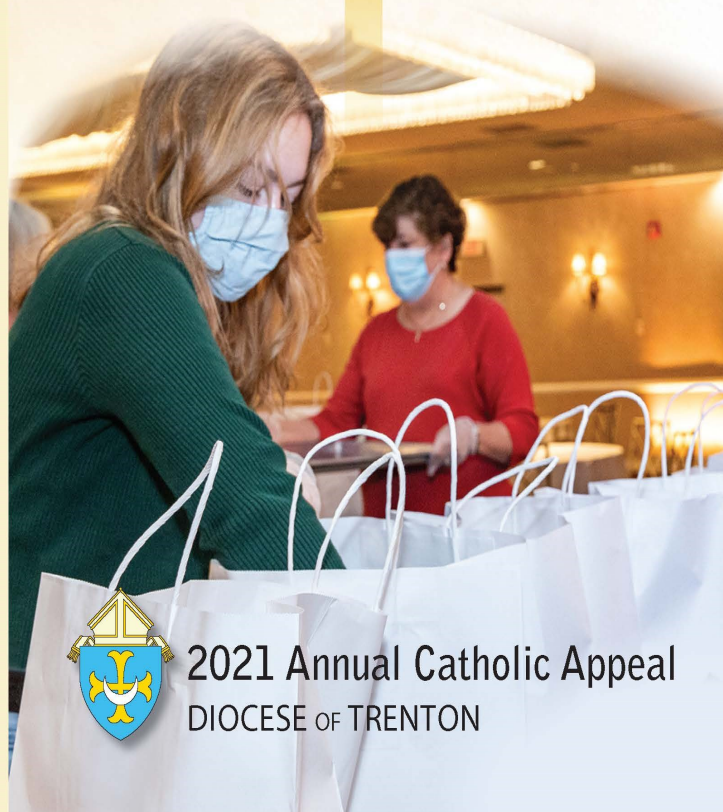

Reflection by Rev. Leonard N. Peterson

“Legalese puts me ill at ease.” That little ditty is my own creation, with the point that the language found in many a legal document that strives to be specific tends rather to be soporific. Reading a statement like “Whereas the party of the first part, herein referred to as ‘X’ can impact the party of the second part, herein referred to as ‘Y’, with intimations of motivation proffered as real which in fact remains dubious, if not false, and also tend to be counterproductive for the manifest purpose of the specified case...” I guarantee that

you will begin to nod off. Consequently we are glad to pay our lawyer’s fee just to read such verbiage and translate for us.

In the time of Our Lord, long before pen on paper was available to most people, and speech was the only medium of exchange of ideas, a good teacher had to use a special talent to get and keep the audience’s attention. Our Lord, the Master teacher, made it look easy, St. Mark underscored this when he wrote what we hear today: “With many such parables He (Jesus) spoke the word to them as they were able to understand it.”

Even we, as modern listeners to Jesus, jaded as we may be by being talked at by teleprompter readers of hired actors parroting for yet another product we don’t really need, we can relate to a lesson of what a small seed planted can produce.

Mark augments that parable with the preceding one Jesus told about the power of the land to yield fruit.

The Lord tells His first listeners and us that this is the way it is for God’s kingdom. It is not a physical place, but a community of God’s friends living His way. Church history chronicles how the Catholic Church has grown to embrace billions, even though it sprang from an unremarkable band of Twelve. This growth, fertilized and watered by the Holy Spirit, is only still here by His willing it. What has kept it alive ultimately traces back to God’s design. The proof is in that very history, which could be called at times a record of human folly.

The prophet Ezekiel’s image of a tender shoot planted atop a cedar on a high mountain, and Jesus’ picture of a tiny mustard seed planted in the earth tell us both of God’s power and our own worth in His eyes. Each of us is an integral part of God’s grand design, and Faith in Him helps us to believe it. We make a big mistake placing our faith elsewhere. But our cooperation with God can bring about something truly wonderful.

Sir Donald Malcolm Campbell, the British car and boat-racer and holder of several world speed records, lost his life while racing a fast boat on one of the lakes of Scotland. The boat exploded and rapidly sank. The only thing that ever surfaced was a toy stuffed animal, Campbell’s alleged “good luck charm.” The toy was powerless to help him in the final and fatal crisis of his life.

Very realistically, and in clear easy to understand language, there is no better demonstration of faith than a person planting seed in a field. God love you, and give you His peace.

Reading I: Ezekiel 17: 22-24

The prophet uses imagery of cedar trees to make his point. The “new twig” from the top of the cedar represents a future king from the House of David. The other cedars represent the kings of other nations.

Reading II: II Corinthians 5: 6-10

When we walk through life in faith, we are given needed courage, and our lives bear fruit. Thus do we become prepared for a favorable judgment by God.

The Gospel: Mark 4: 26-34

The metaphors in Our Lord’s parables allowed Him to speak about God and His kingdom in a way that got His hearers’ attention in ways other teaching techniques could not.

ANNOUNCEMENT OF THE NEW JERSEY BISHOPS

Reinstating the General Obligation to Attend Mass

At this time, due to the observance of public safety protocols and the increase in the availability of vaccines, we have begun a return to some sense of normalcy in various sectors of our society.

Therefore, we the Catholic Bishops of New Jersey, are lifting the dispensation of the Sunday and Holy Days Mass obligation beginning on Saturday, June 5, 2021, and Sunday, June 6, 2021, Solemnity of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ. We welcome the Christian faithful to return to the regular participation in the Sunday Eucharist, the source and summit of our Catholic faith (cf. Code of Canon Law canon 1247 and Catechism of the Catholic Church, n. 2180).

This obligation does not apply to those who are ill; those who have reason to believe that they were recently exposed to the coronavirus or another serious or contagious illness; those who are confined to their home, a hospital, or nursing facility; or those with serious underlying health conditions. One should consult the local pastor if questions arise about the obligation to attend Mass (canon 87).

Please remember that the COVID pandemic is still active and wearing masks is still an option for those who want to continue wearing them. Those who are unvaccinated are also encouraged to continue wearing masks. No one is to be refused sacraments due to vaccination status.



Eucharistic Devotion

The importance of Eucharistic Adoration is shown in the fact that the Church has a ritual that regulates it: the Rite of Eucharistic Exposition and Benediction. This is an extension of the adoration of the Blessed Sacrament which occurs in every Mass: "Behold the Lamb of God, behold him who takes away the sins of the world. Blessed are those called to the supper of the Lamb." Exposition of the Blessed Sacrament flows from the sacrifice of the Mass and serves to deepen our hunger for Communion with Christ and the rest of the Church. The Rite concludes with the ordained minister blessing the faithful with the Blessed Sacrament.

Please join us on Friday's immediately after the 11 AM Mass for Adoration. Benediction begins at 1:45PM. It will also be broadcast on livestream @ stmarkseagirt.com. Come spend some quiet time with the Lord.

**DECLARACIÓN DE LOS OBISPOS DE NUEVA JERSEY*****Sobre restablecer la obligación general de asistir a Misa***

Acogemos a los fieles en su regreso a la participación continua de la eucaristía dominical, fuente y culmen de la fe católica (véase Código de derecho canónico, 1247 y Catecismo de la iglesia católica, n. 2180).

Esta obligación no aplica para aquellos que estén enfermos; para aquellos que tengan una razón de peso y crean que recientemente estuvieron expuestos al coronavirus o a otra enfermedad seria o contagiosa; para aquellos que estén confinados en sus hogares, en un hospital, u hogar de ancianos; o para aquellos con condiciones serias de salud.
