


The Solemnity of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ

Lectionary: 168

Reading I Ex 24:3-8

When Moses came to the people and related all the words and ordinances of the LORD, they all answered with one voice, "We will do everything that the LORD has told us."

Moses then wrote down all the words of the LORD and, rising early the next day, he erected at the foot of the mountain an altar and twelve pillars for the twelve tribes of Israel.

Then, having sent certain young men of the Israelites to offer holocausts and sacrifice young bulls as peace offerings to the LORD, Moses took half of the blood and put it in large bowls; the other half he splashed on the altar.

Taking the book of the covenant, he read it aloud to the people, who answered, "All that the LORD has said, we will heed and do."

Then he took the blood and sprinkled it on the people, saying, "This is the blood of the covenant that the LORD has made with you in accordance with all these words of his."

Reading II Heb 9:11-15

Brothers and sisters:

When Christ came as high priest of the good things that have come to be, passing through the greater and more perfect tabernacle not made by hands, that is, not belonging to this creation, he entered once for all into the sanctuary, not with the blood of goats and calves but with his own blood, thus obtaining eternal redemption. For if the blood of goats and bulls and the sprinkling of a heifer's ashes can sanctify those who are defiled so that their flesh is cleansed, how much more will the blood of Christ, who through the eternal Spirit offered himself unblemished to God, cleanse our consciences from dead works to worship the living God.

For this reason he is mediator of a new covenant: since a death has taken place for deliverance from transgressions under the first covenant, those who are called may receive the promised eternal inheritance.


I am the living bread that came down from heaven, says the Lord; whoever eats this bread will live forever. R. Alleluia, alleluia.

Gospel Mk 14:12-16, 22-26

On the first day of the Feast of Unleavened Bread, when they sacrificed the Passover lamb, Jesus' disciples said to him, "Where do you want us to go and prepare for you to eat the Passover?"

He sent two of his disciples and said to them, "Go into the city and a man will meet you, carrying a jar of water. Follow him. Wherever he enters, say to the master of the house, 'The Teacher says, "Where is my guest room where I may eat the Passover with my disciples?" Then he will show you a large upper room furnished and ready. Make the preparations for us there."

The disciples then went off, entered the city, and found it just as he had told them; and they prepared the Passover. While they were eating, he took bread, said the blessing, broke it, gave it to them, and said, "Take it; this is my body." Then he took a cup, gave thanks, and gave it to them, and they all drank from it. He said to them, "This is my blood of the covenant, which will be shed for many. Amen, I say to you, I shall not drink again the fruit of the vine until the day when I drink it new in the kingdom of God." Then, after singing a hymn, they went out to the Mount of Olives.



ANNOUNCEMENT OF THE NEW JERSEY BISHOPS

Reinstating the General Obligation to Attend Mass

At this time, due to the observance of public safety protocols and the increase in the availability of vaccines, we have begun a return to some sense of normalcy in various sectors of our society.

Therefore, we the Catholic Bishops of New Jersey, are lifting the dispensation of the Sunday and Holy Days Mass obligation beginning on Saturday, June 5, 2021, and Sunday, June 6, 2021, Solemnity of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ. We welcome the Christian faithful to return to the regular participation in the Sunday Eucharist, the source and summit of our Catholic faith (cf. Code of Canon Law canon 1247 and Catechism of the Catholic Church, n. 2180).

This obligation does not apply to those who are ill; those who have reason to believe that they were recently exposed to the coronavirus or another serious or contagious illness; those who are confined to their home, a hospital, or nursing facility; or those with serious underlying health conditions. One should consult the local pastor if questions arise about the obligation to attend Mass (canon 87).

Please remember that the COVID pandemic is still active and wearing masks is still an option for those who want to continue wearing them. Those who are unvaccinated are also encouraged to continue wearing masks. No one is to be refused sacraments due to vaccination status.

These communities have been disproportionately impacted by the pandemic and are lagging well behind the vaccination rate of the white population.

Catholic Charities is educating communities about vaccines, recruiting and training community healthcare workers and hosting clinics at which to date, over 600 people have been vaccinated.



The scholarship application form provides details about writing a short essay and providing your academic accomplishments.



Some Thoughts for June

The month of June gets its name from the Romans, "Juno," Queen of the Roman Gods. The Romans considered it good luck to be married in June. Now we know where the tradition of June brides comes from. We also celebrate graduates this month, and of course we have lovely roses blooming everywhere! Thank you Jesus. Each flower may well just be Your thought of love for us.

June is the month we especially venerate the Sacred Heart of Jesus. On Friday, June 11th, we celebrate with mass, the solemnity of the Sacred Heart. Remember this hymn?: "Sweet Heart of Jesus, fount of love and mercy, today we come, Thy blessings to implore, oh touch our hearts, so cold and so ungrateful and make them Lord, Thine own forever more! Sweet Heart of Jesus, we implore, Oh, make us love Thee more and more...."

The next day it is so fitting that we celebrate the Immaculate Heart of Mary, whose heart was so entwined with the Heart of her Son. Mother Mary keep us close to Jesus.

St. Anthony of Padua is usually celebrated on the 13th, but this June the feast falls on a Sunday. Anyway, "St. Anthony, St. Anthony please stay around as something is usually lost and must be found!" A constant prayer for us seniors.

I'd like to talk about St. Charles L. Wanga and his companion martyrs, which we celebrate on the third. At the end of the 1800's the Society of Missionaries of

Africa had converted many natives, including Charles and his companions who served on the court of the Tribal Lord. This lord was in the habit of forcing himself on his young male pages. Under penalty of death, he demanded that Charles and 17 companions renounce their Christian faith. These young men along with some Anglican converts refused and were burned to death. One of them predicted: "A well which has many sources never runs dry. When we are gone, others will come after us." By 1890 there were some 12,000 converts in southern Uganda.

The Feast of St. Peter and St. Paul falls on the 29th. Both of these great early leaders of the church, were just normal human beings with shortcomings just like us, before their encounter with Jesus and later His Holy Spirit. Peter was presumptuous, fearful and a betrayer. Paul was self righteous and thought himself justified for killing those following the resurrected Christ. It took humility and repentance to ready these men for the outpouring of the Holy Spirit. And baptized in the Holy Spirit they were!! St. Peter and St. Paul, continue to pray for our church. Even though we experience fractures and diverse factions, we must never forget the church was founded by Jesus and it will last forever. "The gates of hell will not prevail against it!"

St. Mark's Altar Rosary Society will be reciting the rosary after the 11am mass on the first Monday of each month.



Eucharistic Devotion



Sacrament which occurs in every Mass: "Behold the Lamb of God, behold him who takes away the sins of the world. Blessed are those called to the supper of the Lamb." Exposition of the Blessed Sacrament flows from the sacrifice of the Mass and serves to deepen our hunger for Communion with Christ and the rest of the Church. The Rite concludes with the ordained minister blessing the faithful with the Blessed Sacrament.

DECLARACIÓN DE LOS OBISPOS DE NUEVA JERSEY

Sobre restablecer la obligación general de asistir a Misa

En este momento, debido a la práctica de protocolos de seguridad y a un aumento en la disponibilidad y acceso a las vacunas, hemos iniciado un regreso a un cierto sentido de normalidad en varios sectores de nuestra sociedad.

Por consiguiente, nosotros, los Obispos católicos de Nueva Jersey, levantamos la dispensa del precepto dominical y festivo, comenzando el fin de semana del sábado y domingo, 5-6 de junio de 2021, Solemnidad del Cuerpo y la sangre de Cristo (Corpus Christi). Acogemos a los fieles en su regreso a la participación continua de la eucaristía dominical, fuente y culmen de la fe católica (véase Código de derecho canónico, 1247 y Catecismo de la iglesia católica, n. 2180).

Esta obligación no aplica para aquellos que estén enfermos; para aquellos que tengan una razón de peso y crean que recientemente estuvieron expuestos al coronavirus o a otra enfermedad seria o contagiosa; para aquellos que estén confinados en sus hogares, en un hospital, u hogar de ancianos; o para aquellos con condiciones serias de salud. Debes consultar con tu párroco local si surgen preguntas sobre la obligación de asistir a Misa (Canon 87).

Finalmente, siguen vigentes los protocolos de seguridad (llevar mascarilla, distancia social, etc.) y las directrices litúrgicas en cada Diócesis de Nueva Jersey, hasta que se modifiquen o revoquen estas directrices por el respectivo Obispo diocesano del área.
