Eighteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time Lectionary: 113

<u>Ex 16:2-4, 12-15</u>

The whole Israelite community grumbled against Moses and Aaron.

The Israelites said to them, "Would that we had died at the LORD's hand in the land of Egypt, as we sat by our fleshpots and ate our fill of bread! But you had to lead us into this desert to make the whole community die of famine!"

Then the LORD said to Moses, "I will now rain down bread from heaven for you. Each day the people are to go out and gather their daily portion; thus will I test them, to see whether they follow my instructions or not. "I have heard the grumbling of the Israelites. Tell them: In the evening twilight you shall eat flesh, and in the morning you shall have your fill of bread, so that you may know that I, the LORD, am your God."

In the evening quail came up and covered the camp. In the morning a dew lay all about the camp, and when the dew evaporated, there on the surface of the desert were fine flakes like hoarfrost on the ground.

On seeing it, the Israelites asked one another, "What is this?" for they did not know what it was.

But Moses told them, "This is the bread that the LORD has given you to eat."

The Transfiguration of the Lord

August 6, 2021

In Year B, the reading for the Transfiguration comes from Mark's gospel. (The Transfiguration also appears in the other two synoptic gospels, Matthew and Luke.) In Mark, Jesus takes Peter, James, and John up a high mountain, apart from the other apostles and disciples.

There, Jesus is transfigured (changed in form and appearance) and appears in dazzling white clothes. Elijah, the great prophet, and



Moses, through whom the Israelites were given the law, appear with Jesus. A cloud appears, overshadowing them, and a voice states, "This is my beloved Son. Listen to him." Jesus charges the three to not share with anyone what they had seen "except when the Son of Man had risen from the dead." They keep their experience to themselves, pondering what Jesus meant by rising from the dead.

How are we to understand the Transfiguration? The story of the Transfiguration is also proclaimed on the second Sunday of Lent—a key part of Jesus' journey towards the Cross. The *Catechism of the Catholic Church* draws parallels between Jesus' Baptism and the Transfiguration. Jesus is baptized at the start of his public ministry. His baptism proclaims the mystery of our first regeneration—we die and rise again with Christ. The "Transfiguration 'is the sacrament of the second regeneration': our own Resurrection (St. Thomas Aquinas, STh III, 45, 4, ad 2). From now on we share in the Lord's Resurrection through the Spirit who acts in the sacraments of the Body of Christ.

The Transfiguration gives us a foretaste of Christ's glorious coming, when he 'will change our lowly body to be like his glorious body (Phil 3:21)'" (*Catechism of the Catholic Church*, no. 556). During the Prayer after Communion, we pray that God might "transform us into the likeness of your [his] Son, / whose radiant splendor you willed to make manifest / in his glorious Transfiguration." The Collect, or opening prayer, tells us that the mystery of the Transfiguration "prefigures our full adoption to sonship." The Transfiguration, initially revealed to Peter, James, and John, reveals to all of us a taste of what is yet to come.

The Transfiguration is the fourth of the Luminous Mysteries of the Rosary.

Money. Sadly, to many minds at any time that's really what makes the world go 'round. Speaking of same, I found out recently that there are around 180 different types of currency in the world. These include the Albanian "lech" and the Moroccan "dirham" and the Zambian "kwacha." But most of us are more likely to know the slang terms for the US dollar than any of those. Do you know where at least 2 of those terms come from, namely "bread" or "dough?"

We've all heard those, even though their usage may have largely faded from our conversations, but is very much alive in vintage gangster movies. It all sprang from our basic need for nutrition, which is something very important. The term "breadwinner," used commonly from the 1940s onward, took this idea and ran with it. The term "bread" was directly tied with someone who earned money. From there, it's easy to see how "bread," and subsequently "dough" came into common usage.

Such thinking would have been completely foreign to that long ago crowd of 5,000 men (not counting women and children) gathered around Jesus on that fine day long ago. For them, bread was almost a sacred thing. Certainly it was part of their basic and simple diet. Bread is mentioned 492 times in the original languages of the Bible, and so it is easy to see how important bread was to everyday life in those times. To reduce it to slang for something so mundane as money would have been unthinkable for them.

A huge crowd had followed Jesus, even though He needed a rest. Why did they? Because they had seen the "signs" (John's chosen synonym for "miracles") that Jesus had performed for the sick. Perhaps unable to express it, they had also followed Him because of an inner hunger for truth. The truth about life; its purpose and its terminus; and how best to live the time in between.

For now He would take care of their stomachs. Later, Jesus would care for their souls by offering them the whole Truth. Christian missionaries always build a well, or a feeding kitchen or a medicine dispensary before they start to preach.

Note that all 4 evangelists record this event, because they saw it as so pivotal a moment. It was the guarantor of the Eucharist, a far greater miracle that would feed all the succeeding generations into the millions including ourselves. Time, space, and numbers are no obstacles to God's will or His word. Believing that enables our thoughts to focus on the Mass, the quiet miracle among us that often isn't so named or listed among others like Lourdes, Fatima or Guadalupe.

Simple but supernatural. Invisible change more real than rain. Jesus still cares for His people and nourishes us with spiritual food and drink using the instruments of bread and wine. The Eucharist is the Church's one true treasure, so easily available to us in the so-called "First World" that we must guard against apathy and pray for our sisters and brothers in the so-called "Third World" who either do not have easy access to it, or none at all. With persecution added.

Here are some thoughts on all of this from the great Saint Thomas More, the English chancellor who was executed by the very same Henry VIII who had picked him for the office, but had to silence Thomas for his opposition to Henry's' claim to be head of the Church in England. He is responding by letter to a friend about what the Eucharist means for him: "Your reasons for wanting me to stay away from Holy Communion are exactly the ones which cause me to go so often. My distractions are great, but it is in Communion that I recollect myself. I have temptations many times a day; by daily Communion I get the strength to overcome them. I have much very important business to handle and I need light and wisdom; it is for this reason that I go to Holy Communion every day to consult Jesus about them."

God love you, and give you His peace.

Today's Readings:

Reading I: Exodus 16: 2-4, 12-15

Reacting to the people's complaint, Yahweh provides prompt relief by sending the manna and the quail. The manna, for St. John, is a "type" of the Holy Eucharist.

Reading II: Ephesians 4: 17, 20-24

The "old man" for Paul represents the convert's life led only with mere human resources to go by leading to weakness and sin. The new life, "put on" at Baptism is an actual incorporation into Christ.

The Gospel: John 6: 24-35

Jesus instructs the crowd that has followed Him on the nature of the true bread from heaven, which is Christ Himself. This Bread alone gives a person true life.

Thank God for beautiful August! All good and beautiful things come from God and August (which means venerable) is no exception. See the copious snow ball bushes, the waving crepe myrtles, the stands of gladiolas! What an artist is our God!

August is chocked full of very important events and saints. The events being: On the 3rd, the dedication of St. Mary Major, Papal Basilica; On the 6th, the Transfiguration of our Lord; on the 15th, the Assumption of our Blessed Mother. The saints we celebrate, to name a few: St. Lawrence, St. Clare, St. Bartholomew, St. Maximillian Kolbe, St. Monica and St. Augustine.

The Church of St. Mary Major is the Basilica of the Pope. In the 2nd Century, a Roman Patrician, Giovanni and his wife being childless prayed to the blessed Mother that she

would designate an heir for their wealth. They had a vision in which the Blessed Mother said she wished to have a church built in her honor on the Esquiline Hill and the sign to verify this dream was that the prospective layout of the church would be outlined in snow. This was the month of August. Giovanni approached Pope Liberius and found out that the Pope had the same vision on Aug 4, 352. Mary said a miraculous snowfall would occur that would outline where the church was to be built in her honor. The next day, August 5, snow indeed fell on the Esquiline Hill in the midst of a heat wave. This event provided us with one of Our Lady's oldest titles: Our Lady of the Snows. The basilica holds some of the finest art work and architectural wonders of the world. Two noteworthy treasures in this basilica are a relic from the manger in Bethlehem and an image of the Blessed Mother which tradition says was painted by St. Luke.

On the 6th we celebrate the Transfiguration of our Lord. He takes Peter, James and John to the top of Mt. Tabor (very high; from there you can glimpse the Sea of Galilee which is about 20 miles away). Jesus does this on his last trip to Jerusalem where He will face his passion and death. In the Transfiguration of our Lord, where His face shone like the sun, He tells Moses and Elijah of his final act of redemption for mankind. Now His mission is nearing completion tying the old testament to the new.

My Brothers and Sisters in Christ, let us take advantage of all that August offers us spiritually, especially let us celebrate Mary's Assumption and read about the wonderful saints we celebrate in August. They light the way for us. They show us how they overcame adversity and followed the will of God. They help us turn our thoughts away from the chaos, which is our world right now and towards heaven, which is after all our final destination. Let us forever be charitable with each other and with those in need, be it physical, emotional or spiritual need.
