

Easter 2021: 'Behold, I make all things new' (Revelation 21:5)

A message from Bishop David M. O'Connell, C.M.

The three days before Easter Sunday are, indeed, instructive. They speak of commitment to something great, of sharing our very selves with one another, of the sacrifice that comes with love, of the precious yet limited time we have on this earth, of the hope that beyond this life, there is even more, even better --- in fact, an eternity of joy for those who have faith in God and live their lives in love!

These are good lessons. These are all part of the Easter message for those of us who believe in the Life, Death and Resurrection of the Lord

Jesus Christ --- and they are comforting for all people of good will, no matter what their faith traditions may be. Easter and this wondrous season of new life all around us is a time of peace and promise.

Easter is a special time for Christians, for everyone really. While Holy Thursday and Good Friday --- and the sacrificial events they commemorate --always come first, there is now and always will follow the sunrise of Easter and the peace and promise of eternal life.'

Overview and Streaming schedule for Holy Week and Easter

This Holy Week and Easter, hundreds of thousands of Catholics in the Diocese of Trenton will take part in Masses and services either inside or outside their churches while observing pandemic precautions or at home via livestream. The special events of Holy Week will commemorate the final days of Jesus Christ's earthly life and celebrate on Easter Sunday, April 4, the joy of new life with his Resurrection.

In light of the ongoing risk of COVID-19 infection, the dispensation from the obligation of Mass attendance, issued last spring by Bishop David M. O'Connell, C.M., remains in place until further notice. Pandemic directives issued by the Diocese strongly urge all those who are ill, in high risk categories or concerned about attending in-church Masses to connect to Holy Week events through their parish's livestreaming opportunities.

The Diocese will livestream/record all of Bishop O'Connell's Holy Week Masses and services via its <u>digital</u> and <u>social media</u> sites.


